## Education Policy

### 1. Mission Statement of Didcot Railway Centre.

Our Vision is to recreate the golden age of the Great Western Railway.

Our Mission is:

- To be a nationally accredited independent organisation
- To maintain Didcot Railway Centre as a working museum dedicated to the Great Western Railway
- To provide suitable facilities to demonstrate restoration and maintenance of the collection
- To be open to the public for the enjoyment, benefit and education of the community

Our Challenge is to become a more commercially orientated organisation in order to achieve the Vision.

### 2. Education Mission Statement.

To promote widely and encourage life-long interest, understanding and enjoyment of the heritage and environment of railways, in particular the former Great Western Railway and British Railways (Western Region) and its successors, through the educational and vocational use of the collections and associated information held by the Great Western Society.

### 3. Education Policy.

- to ensure that access to education is provided to as many people as possible in an environment where safety is paramount
- to set out the exhibits in the most appropriate ways with clear interpretation to encourage the interest of as many people as possible
- to create a centre of excellence for education in an industrial museum setting and to support co-operation with other museums
- to work in partnership with Education Authorities and other educational institutions to encourage interest and learning and promote work experience
- to be aware of developments in the world of education and to respond to them in an appropriate manner
- to encourage young people to develop their skills in a young volunteers programme
- to ensure that the educational function is considered in all decisions affecting the Society and that the Education Policy is reviewed every three years
- to ensure that the Society's action plans include for the provision of an effective structure and adequate resources to meet its educational targets
- to ensure that all staff are aware of and sympathetic to the educational role of the Society and that full provision is made for the development and training of those staff and volunteers working in an educational role for the Society
- to set specific and measurable educational objectives to be evaluated annually

#### **4. Programme of services**

A comprehensive educational programme for people of all ages and with a wide range of railway knowledge is to be offered both at the Didcot Railway Centre and at external venues.

- National Curriculum targeted programmes for schools
- encouragement and practical help in the learning of science and engineering
- structured visits and activities for children and family groups
- programme of railway related activities for young people in schools and further education including the Society's young volunteers
- adult education and public lecture programmes and workshops
- guided tours on both formal and informal bases
- opportunities for work experience and work shadowing
- support to other museums and local societies
- assistance to specialist researchers
